State Support of Communities

- State assistance programs effective in facilitating community sustainability efforts:
 - Direct engagement
 - Familiarity with communities and their peers.
 - Statutory, reporting, grant and other mechanisms that drive interaction.
- North Carolina has a number of assistance programs:
 - Key example: programs to encourage *sustainable materials management* by communities.


Community Involvement and Benefits from Sustainable Materials Management

- Local Governments on front line of materials management:
 - Operation
 - Financing
 - Decision-making about services
- Local Governments enjoy benefits from well-run systems:
 - Unit efficiency
 - Cost avoidance
 - Improved Services
- Local Governments not always savvy about their role in the materials supply chain or equipped to improve efforts.

Broader State Involvement and Benefits of SMM

- State Roles in SMM:
 - Setting of baseline policies
 - Direct influence over infrastructure development
 - Assistance to communities in improving conditions and deploying best management practices.
- State Benefits:
 - Reduced environmental impacts from disposal
 - Improvement of state economy job and business creation, support of manufacturing



Examples of Local SMM Practices

- Municipal Curbside Recycling
 - Sustainability gains from adopting new collection formats
- Rural Drop-off
 - Efficient transport of recyclables
- Other Local Recycling Programs
 - Broadening of community material focus and offering of additional public services

Achieving New Efficiency in Curbside Collection

Old Collection System Using Bins



Average Bin-based program: **247 lbs**/household/year


More than 85% of NC municipal curbside customers now have carts

New Collection System Using Carts




Average Cart-based programs: 445 lbs/household/year

Additional Aspects of Community of Net Zero Activities and State Support

- Energy and water use in public buildings:
 - North Carolina assists communities through the *Utility Savings Initiative* (*USI*).
 - USI track record indicates many opportunities for successful, high return-on-investment initiatives.
- Energy and water use in businesses and institutions:
 - Waste Reduction Partners program conducts audits and recommends reduction strategies.
 - WRP track record indicates savings can be immediate with very quick pay-back.

Recommendations for Federal Support

- Convene states and communities with each other
- Convene states and communities with other stakeholders (especially private sector)
- Provide resources direct and strategic support of local programs and state programs that help communities.
- Create an atmosphere of support and commitment by decision-makers.

Fed Support of North Carolina's SMM Efforts

- Region 4 EPA actively engaged:
 - Direct assistance of key projects
 - Effective convening of Region 4 states
 - Support of Southeast Recycling Development Council and other regional/national efforts
 - Advocacy for regional and local needs with headquarters and other stakeholders.
- EPA Headquarters Support
 - Convening of key dialogues with brand companies on recycling issues
- USDA and DOE
 - Funding of Waste Reduction Partners program
